Welcome to Queen Katharine Academy. We are delighted that your child has been offered a place to join us in September. I am extremely proud to be the Principal of an Academy where we are committed to providing the very best education for all our students, irrespective of their ability or background.

Over the last five years, the progress made by GCSE students has improved significantly; this has resulted in students achieving, on average, a grade higher. This reflects the improvements made in the quality of education, personal development, behaviour and leadership, which have all had a positive impact on pupil outcomes. It was with huge pride that we received a 'Good' outcome in our latest OFSTED report, with inspectors noting in the report, "results have improved impressively year on year".



Queen Katharine Academy has been transformed and is now a Nationally recognised school as evidenced by our TES and Pearson Gold Teaching Awards in 2021.

According to ALPs data analysis Queen Katharine Academy Sixth Form has consistently made above average progress in A levels placing us in the top 10% of the country for this measure, every year, for the last 6 years in a row—very few schools in the country have achieved this. The SSAT also recognised the progress Queen Katharine Academy students make in Sixth Form for both A levels and vocational qualifications with sought after awards—it is rare to achieve in one category, rarer still to achieve in both.

Schools are only as strong as the bond between parents, carers, students, and staff and therefore we always seek effective, mutually beneficial, and long-lasting partnerships; we know these will ensure our students can thrive and become their very best. As a result, we have high expectations of everyone connected to our school community, based on our guiding principle of RESPECT.

All individuals will hold a fair, objective, and permissive attitude toward opinions, beliefs, and practices that differ from their own




# STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Student Leadership is a vital part of our academy community. Our student leadership team is led by our Head Students, these are members of our sixth form team and are appointed annually, along with our year team Prefects and tutor representatives. Our student leadership team are an integral part of our school community providing a clear student voice ensuring we have an understanding and appreciation of our students' views, concerns, and ideas. They play an important role in many of the decisions made here at Queen Katharine Academy because we understand that the success of our community starts with our students.



Our student leaders play an important part in our transition events as well as other areas of student leadership within and beyond the Academy. Your child will meet some of our student leaders during their Transition days in July and when they start here at Queen Katharine Academy in September.

Our student leadership team are trained anti-bullying ambassadors, who embed our RESPECT values, encouraging students to be good role models and up standers. They model behaviours which encourage respect for each other as well as the importance of showing tolerance and understanding. They are responsible for supporting the younger years through moving on together in secondary school, helping you settle in, especially in the first few weeks of school. Our team of student mentors play an important role in our young students' development providing support and motivation whilst modelling the RESPECT behaviours we hold sacrosanct here at Queen Katharine Academy.



We launched Anti-Bullying Week by training 75 student leaders as anti-bullying ambassadors. They will be on duty at lunch times and around school to ensure that peer support is always available. At QKA we embed empathy and work together to tackle any unkindness and bullying!



They lead by example and are ambassadors for our Academy, showing excellent teamwork, uniform, and punctuality. They encourage others to be independent, confident individuals and guide students through the steps to success; supporting others in identifying their talents and achieving their goals. Our student leaders inspire students to treat others as they would like to be treated and support others in being able to talk about things that excite or worry them. They allow others to express themselves in a purposeful way — getting them motivated, and introducing them to clubs, events, and activities.

We are passionate about the importance of nurturing individual gifts and talents at every level and our enrichment programme encourages every young person to develop life skills that will stay with them long after they leave our care.


#### Activities your child could take part in include:

# Slam poets, site visits and accelerate curriculum...

As the education committee launches an inquiry into challenges faced by Gypsy and Roma pupils, schools share their secrets on turning things around ...

Roma parents used to ask Petr Torak for help taking children out of Peterborough's Queen Katharine Academy.

Now they ask the chief executive of the local migrant charity Compas how to enrol in the school that recently won a Pearson Teaching Award for its Roma inclusion work.

# Understand and build links with communities

The "turning point" for Queen Katharine (QKA) came after it sought Torak's help in 2016 to tackle the disproportionately poor behaviour amongst Roma pupils.


Torak, a governor and also Roma, helped deputy principal Jane Driver and principal Lynn Mayes visit Slovakia, the birthplace of many pupils. They saw "harrowing" living conditions, children in special schools without good reason, and a general acceptance that Roma education ended at primary level. Torak claimed such marginalisation was behind the decision of many European Roma to move to Britain.

Leaders then educated staff about pupils' backstories and how their behaviour was a "response to lived experiences", as well as Roma history, culture and values. "We came back determined to give these young people aspiration and a sense they deserve to stand shoulder to shoulder with everybody else,"

Compas also sent Roma workers to visit families of absent children.

When Paula Strachan became head of St Teresa's





Catholic Primary in Darlington, she visited a nearby site where many Roma pupils lived.

T wasn't afraid to ask honest questions," she says. "If heads don't understand the groups we're serving, we can't do our jobs."

She saw how common illiteracy was, and

now telephones parents who cannot read letters and stands outside her school each morning so parents can flag concerns in person.

Driver says schools must be brave trying new approaches – like QKA's "accelerator curriculum".

Realising many Roma pupils' poor English and frequent spells



away make traditional teaching unviable, leaders cram most of the curriculum into half the time. Classes are smaller and language-learning is weaved throughout all subjects.

Roma Progress 8 performance and attendance have both improved. The school also runs a Roma gifted and talented

#### **SCHOOL PLANNER**

We will provide students with an A5 planner and a timetable on their first day with us. Bringing their planner to school every day is as important as wearing their uniform!

The planner is used to keep track of homework, communications between home and the Academy, your child's personal pledges and their rewards. You will also find lots of useful information inside about the Academy and curriculum subjects.

Homework is to be written in the planner on the day it is set. Students will get both physical and online homework so they should make sure they know how to access it. If they have any questions, they should ask their subject teachers.


# SIMS PARENT APP



# **MOBILE & DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY**

We are committed to providing the best learning environment for our students. To ensure that our students are able to access their learning and make progress without distractions, we ensure that mobile phones and other electronic devices, including the use of headphones are switched off and put away at all times within the Academy grounds. If a student is seen using an electronic device within the Academy the item will be confiscated and will be required to be collected by a parent or guardian.



#### **UNIFORM**

When everyone is dressed the same this reduces distraction, sharpens focus on learning and progress and makes the classroom a more positive learning environment. Our uniform gives students a sense of belonging and creates an identity for the Academy in the community. A letter will be sent a home informing you of upcoming parents evenings and you can then book times with teachers through the online platform.

# **ATTENDANCE**

At Queen Katharine Academy, we are working to ensure that all students attend school on a daily basis. Our target is for each student to achieve at least 96% attendance.

To help us with this, if your child is unwell and cannot attend school, please contact us on **01733 383 888** to inform us of illness before 8:30am on **each day** of a student's absence. It is our procedure to contact you when your child is absent in the morning if we have not heard from you to explain their absence. Please provide evidence of any medical appointments that are taken during the school day if no other time is possible.

A child with 85% attendance or less at the end of the school year will have had absences amounting to half a term of school days. Students whose absences are a cause for concern will be monitored closely by the Student Support Officers and Attendance Officer, and are subject to the local authority and government attendance policies.

# HOME ACADEMY PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT

- Attend each day punctually, attending lessons on time, ready and fully equipped to begin learning straightaway
- Show pride in my personal presentation by wearing the uniform correctly
- Give all letters and information from the Academy to my parent/carer and return replies promptly
- Respect and take care of Academy equipment, facilities and surroundings so everyone can enjoy them
- Never bring to the Academy anything that is illegal
- Behave on the way to and from school as an ambassador for the Academy displaying positive behaviour and acting as a role model for other students

# FREE SCHOOL MEALS

A pupil whose parent or carer receives any of the following benefits is entitled to a Free School Meal:

Income Support (IS)

Income Based Job Seekers Allowance (JSA(IB))

Employment and Support Allowance (Income Related) (ESA (IR))

Child Tax Credit (CTC), provided you do not also receive Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by the Inland Revenue, that does not exceed £16,190

Guarantee Credit element of State Pension Credit

Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Children who receive IS or IBJSA in their own right are also entitled to free school meals.

#### Free School Meal application process for new Year 7 children

#### WHO NEEDS TO APPLY?

You <u>only</u> need to submit an application for your child if you have **never** applied to Cambridgeshire County Council for that child before. www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/freeschoolmeals

If you have previously applied to Cambridgeshire County Council for your child (whether or not the application was successful), you do not need to reapply. This is because the CCC Free School Meal team will already have the information they need.

For those that do need to apply, please read the following:

#### WHEN CAN I APPLY?

You can apply at any time from now onwards.

Please ensure you submit an application before term starts in September.

#### **HOW DO I APPLY?**

Applications can be made online at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/freeschoolmeals

Please ensure the following:

When asked which school your child attends, please state their current primary school followed by their new secondary school eg:

Example - Name of primary school/Name of secondary school

i.e., Discovery Primary School / Queen Katherine Academy

Please do not leave this section blank otherwise the Free School Meal team will not be able to notify your child's secondary school of their entitlement.

In the section 'Child's Details' you will be asked "Has the child received Free School Meals since April 2018?" – it is **essential** that you select '**No**' to enable you to complete the rest of the application.

Please therefore select 'no' even if your child has been receiving Free School Meals.

At the end of the form it is **essential** that you click '**submit'** – otherwise the application does not reach the Free School Meal team and you will need to complete it again.

Please note: if you do not have internet access, the school can provide you with a paper copy.

#### What are the best aspects of QKA?


The best aspects of QKA are the amazing students and staff I work with each day. We have a friendly and supportive atmosphere in lessons and around the whole school.
