Festivals


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San Fermines

San Fermines is a week-long festival, which is celebrated in Pamplona in the north of Spain. The festival stars on 7th of July to honour San Fermín, the town's patron saint.

The main event is bullfighting. The bulls run early in the morning from the bullring through the city's main street. People wear traditional clothes: white shirts and trousers with red sashes around their waist.

The festival starts with the Chupinazo, which is a large rocket from Pamplona's square. Many people around the world come to Pamplona to enjoy the party.

La tomatina is a festival, which is celebrated in Buñol, a village in Valencia in the east of Spain. The festival takes place the last Wednesday in August.

Interview

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One of our year 13 students is going to spend one year in Spain working in a school as an English teaching assistant. I am sure it will be an amazing experience, not only for improving his Spanish, but also to get immersed in the Spanish culture.

• What do you think about the Spanish A- level? What topics do you think are interesting?

I enjoyed taking Spanish as an A-level, despite being quite difficult at times I found it incredibly interesting especially when learning more about Spain's history, it's monarchy and dictatorship. For Spanish A-level you focus a lot more on grammar and ensuring that what you are saying is right and when it's not the teachers are always supportive in helping you correct any mistakes .

• What tips can you offer for the students who are going to do Spanish next year?

Tips I have for students taking Spanish A-level are to persevere with the subject, it's very easy to stop once it becomes challenging but it is worth the hard work in the long run. Something which really helped me was watching Spanish films and TV shows and reading different types of text in Spanish, this helps with learning new words and being able to understand the language when it is spoken by different people and at different speeds.

How do you feel before starting this new adventure?

I am very excited to be able to go to Spain this year and spend time there meeting new people and being somewhere different to home. Some things do make me nervous about leaving home but I know that it is something I am going to enjoy. I am definitely looking forward to the Spanish food and weather!



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Could you explain what you are going to do in Spain next year?

This year I am going to Spain as part of a programme which helps you to find a job as an English teacher, I will be placed in a school in Spain where I will help students to improve their English skills whilst also being able to improve my own Spanish skills. This programme is great for me as it allows me to travel whilst also getting paid.

How did you find out about this opportunity?

I found this vacancy by researching different programmes as I knew taking a gap year was something I wanted to do but I wanted to ensure I had something to do whilst on this break. The programme is run by the British Council who have been very helpful so far in finding me a placement in Spain.

• Can you explain the process you went through to secure this position?

To get this position there was an application process which ensured I was right for this type of job, I gave my preferences of region in Spain and type of age group I would like to teach. I was allocated to Aragon and I am still waiting to find out my exact area and school, once I receive this I will be able to move forward with moving to Spain .

What do you need to travel to Spain?

To travel to Spain I need a visa which will allow to work in Spain for the time that I am there, I also need a valid passport and a certificate which will allow me to work in a school in a foreign country.
